### **Collection Description**

#### **Biographical Note**

Arthur Cayley Headlam was born in 1862 and died in 1947. Headlam was an English prelate in the Church of England. He served as principal of King's College, London from 1903 to 1912. From 1918 to 1923 he was regius professor of Divinity at Oxford where he was also canon of

Christ Church. He was appointed Bishop of Gloucester in 1923 and remained in that position until 1945. *Doctrine of the Church and Christian Reunion* is one of many publications by Headlam.

**Scope and Content Note**

This manuscript is a typed carbon copy of the original essay on the Anglican Church in Canada. The essay has no date but the text indicates that the piece was written in the early 1920s. Headlam examines various influences on the church in Canada that will impact the success and future growth of the denomination.
