Collection Description

Historical Note

Dr. N. C. Nothmann, the owner of Covent Garden Bookshop, London, established a small press, Covent Garden Press, in the late 1960s or early 1970s. The press published fiction, poetry and essays, in addition to a catalogue describing the archives of William S. Burroughs. The press launched their Covent Garden Series in March 1972, which included one series of publications featuring short stories, a second featuring poetry, and a third featuring essays. Contributing authors included Kingsley Amis, Ronald Hayman, Susan Hill, Charles Tomlinson and John Wain. The press' first descriptive catalogue of its publications was printed in 1973 and lists works by William S. Burroughs, Bob Cobbing, Jean Cocteau, Hugh MacDiarmid, Harold Pinter, and Sacheverell Sitwell, in addition to those who wrote for the Covent Garden Series. In 1974, the bookshop and press went into liquidation and the appointed receiver instructed that all publishing be stopped immediately. Neither business has been in operation since.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists of the records of Covent Garden Press from 1968 to 1977, the bulk of which are documents related to works that the press either published or seriously considered for publication. These documents include typescripts, proofs, correspondence about the work and its publication, and notes detailing design and layout. Works include Kingsley Amis's *Dear Illusion*, William S. Burrough's *Port of Saints*, Susan Hill's *The Custodian*, Hugh MacDiarmid's *Song of the Seraphim*, and Harold Pinter's *Monologue*. A small amount of correspondence primarily documents the business conducted between the press and its authors, although some early letters focus on the bookselling business, rather than publishing, and some later letters comment on the bankruptcy. Also included in the collection are press clippings and reviews about books published by the press, copies of the press' catalogue, and a small number of financial records including receipts on advances paid to authors, calculations of royalties paid to authors, and invoices. Finally, a handful of notes and letters relate to the reception hosted by Covent Garden Press and Martini and Rossi to celebrate the launch of the Covent Garden Series.
