Collection Description

Biographical Note

Will Inman (1923-2009), poet and editor. He was born William Archibald McGirt, Jr. in Wilmington, North Carolina, and graduated from Duke University in 1943. After working in a shipyard during World War II, he was called before the Un-American Activities Committee in 1956 because of his participation in trade unions. From 1964-1971 he edited and published the poetry newsletter *Kauri*. Inman was appointed a Poet-in-Residence at American University in 1967.

Walter Lowenfels (1897-1976), poet and journalist. He published his first collection of poetry in 1925 and published numerous books of poetry throughout his life. Lowenfels married Lillian Apotheker in 1926 and they moved to Paris shortly thereafter, returning to the United States in 1938. Lowenfels wrote for the Pennsylvania *Daily Worker* from 1938-1953, and in 1954 was convicted of conspiracy to overthrow the United States government, a ruling later overturned for lack of evidence. In the 1950s and 1960s Lowenfels published anthologies of writings related to Marxism and political oppression.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists almost entirely of correspondence between Will Inman and Walter Lowenfels from 1954-1975. Correspondence is from 1963-1975 and mostly concerns the publication of Lowenfels' poetry in *Kauri*, a poetry newsletter edited by Will Inman. Inman and Lowenfels were friends and some of the correspondence is more personal in nature. Correspondence also includes some letters to Will Inman from publications where he submitted his own poetry. The collection also includes writings by Lowenfels and press releases related to his published poetry collections.
