Biographical Note

Wilson Lumpkin, Georgia legislator (1804-ca. 1814), United States congressman (1815-1817; 1827-1831), Georgia governor (1831-1835), and United States senator (1837-1841), was born January 14, 1783, in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, and died December 28, 1870, in Athens, Georgia.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists of the papers of Wilson Lumpkin from 1839-1840. The papers include four letters written while Lumpkin was a U.S. Senator. They are concerned with both political and personal matters.
