### Collection Description

#### Biographical Note

Eulah C. Pharr (1897-1989), African American domestic, was born on June 7, 1897. She worked as a housekeeper for San Franciscan Noel Sullivan and in that role became acquainted with many

famous figures in the 1930s. Most of the noteworthy people whom she befriended were known for their work in the dramatic arts, music, and literature, as Mr. Sullivan was an influential patron of the fine arts. Pharr maintained a close friendship with Harlem Renaissance poet Langston Hughes until his death in 1967. She died on November 18, 1989 in Los Angeles, California at age 92.

### **Scope and Content Note**

The collection consists of the papers of Eulah C. Pharr from 1929-1984. Materials include correspondence, printed material, scrapbooks, and photographs. Correspondence includes letters from Langston Hughes to Eulah Pharr, referencing their friendship and Hughes's travels. Additionally, the collection includes a lengthy letter to Pharr from a W.E. Harper, a resident of Harlem, which details life in Harlem in 1972.

Printed material includes clippings and sheet music by Langston Hughes collected by Pharr. Particularly noteworthy is the sheet music "For This We Fight", which was sung at the Negro Freedom Rally at Madison Square Garden, New York City, on June 7, 1943. The opera *Troubled Island*, for which Hughes wrote the libretto, is also contained in the collection, with inscriptions by Hughes dedicating the material to its recipients. Additionally, the collection includes several clippings referencing Langston Hughes, Noel Sullivan, and African American opera singer Marion Anderson.

Photographs include Langston Hughes, Mexican movie star Ramon Novarro, and several famous female vocalists, including Ethel Waters, Marion Anderson, and Elisabeth Rethberg. Many of the photographs are inscribed with dedications to Eulah Pharr.

Scrapbooks contain correspondence, clippings, printed material, and photographs. Several scrapbooks are focused on Langston Hughes and contain extensive correspondence with Langston Hughes, his funeral program, and some of Hughes's short stories and poems. The scrapbooks also contain correspondence with other figures of the Harlem Renaissance era including Dorothy Vena Johnson.
