Biographical Note

James Martin Wright, educator and author, was born December 3, 1879, in Missouri, and died June 18, 1965, place unknown. He was a graduate of Johns Hopkins University (1905) and

Columbia University (Ph.D. 1915); the author of *History of the Bahama Islands, 1815-1848* (1905), *The Free Negro in Maryland, 1634-1860* (1921), and other works; and a contributor of articles to several journals. He taught history at Johns Hopkins after his graduation, and later, at Agnes Scott College.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists of the papers of James Wright from 1900-1965. The papers include articles, correspondence, notes, manuscript, memorabilia relating to James Martin Wright. The articles and manuscript are by Wright on the Bahamas; one article reprint is on the Atlanta street railway fare problem (1930). Correspondence is to Wright in Baltimore, circa 1907; memorabilia includes a certificate from Johns Hopkins, invitations, announcements, and programs.
